



Rule of Thirds

In this photo of my cousin Emma, I used the rule of thirds to position her against the intersecting points all the way to the right- giving the photo a more unique and focused look.



Depth

BACKGROUND

Cropping

 Symmetry and Cropping in this photo was used to highlight the symmetry between the headlights and the grille of the Pontiac.



Cropping

Cropping was used to cut out the bulk of this plant and focus in on the blooming flowers as opposed to taking a photo of the whole plant and only being able to see the flowers from a far due to the many leaves.



Lighting

In this photo, I used Lighting to show the difference it makes in two rooms of my house. Although each room is the same color, I turned on all the lights and opened the doors in the family room (right) and left off all the lights in the kitchen (left). Using the divider that is between the two rooms, I was able to capture the different levels of lighting at the same time.



BACKGROUND

In the glass, I put different color food coloring in a glass of water and oil. I decided to put a white napkin behind the glass, so I could get a clearer picture of the different colors bursting into the water.

Motion

Rule of Thirds

I used the rule of thirds to align the right column with the right intersecting points, then I also tried to fit in the other column and plant to make it more symmetrical.



Color

 I took a picture of my nephew's crayons since they were on a white piece of paper. The brightness of the crayons contrasts well with the white paper.



Lines

In another picture of my steps, I used the rising railways to make this picture of lines have more depth.



Framing

In this photo of my house, I used two tree trunks to the right and left of my house to frame the picture and eliminate anything that is unnecessary.



Color-Depth

I stood different books in my house up that had differing colors and heights. The differing colors captures your attention where as the heights give the photo more depth since not all the books are fully visible.



Framing

I turned off all the lights in the front of my house and tried to frame only the glass part of my front door as opposed to my whole door- making it easier to focus on the glass and the light that it brings in on it's own.
